

What are my duties?

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Let's talk about our duties!

How do you feel about your daily activities?

A lot of people – children, teenagers, and adults – have to do determined things in their day-by-day. What do you usually have to do?

Do you help your parents at home? Believe it or not, it's a great way to start a good habit and keep good relations as social individuals!

It can help us to live life in harmony. It can help us to establish stronger relationships, and

it can also lead us to build a more human society!

Starter activities

1. After holding a conversation about your duties, write **always**, **usually**, **sometimes** or **never** right after each statement below:

- I make my bed in the morning.
- I clean my tennis shoes.
- I wash the dishes to help my mother.
- I go to the bank for my father.
- I play with my siblings.

2. If you answered **always** or **usually** to most of the statements above, you really must feel happy for building a more human society. If you answered **sometimes** or **never** to most of them, you might try to improve your relationships at home first.

3. Do you usually talk to your relatives at home? What do you usually talk about?

4. Students talk about the things in the list above that they have to do, or don't have to do, at home. Follow the example:

A - I have to cook lunch every day. Do you have to cook at home?

B - No, I don't have to cook. My sister has to cook dinner sometimes. But I have to go shopping. Who has to go shopping in your family?

For example when I arrive home from school in the afternoons (usually after 3:30 pm) I am expected to do my homework first when I arrive so I won't forget to do it and schoolwork is considered the most important thing to finish first. After finishing my homework, I am usually expected to do some chores such as caring for the dog, helping with the laundry, mowing the grass, or maybe even helping start the dinner. I usually have duties to do in the mornings before school too like to make my bed, to tidy up my room, and sometimes make my own lunch to take to eat at school. My mother is single and this situation requires more help from me to make the household run smoothly. Also, I have many outside activities to attend during both the week and weekend. I play the guitar in the school band and have to attend practice early in the morning. Here in Aurora I have practice as early as 6 am in the morning until 8 am every weekday morning before school. c) Do you agree there are different duties for boys and for girls? Explain.

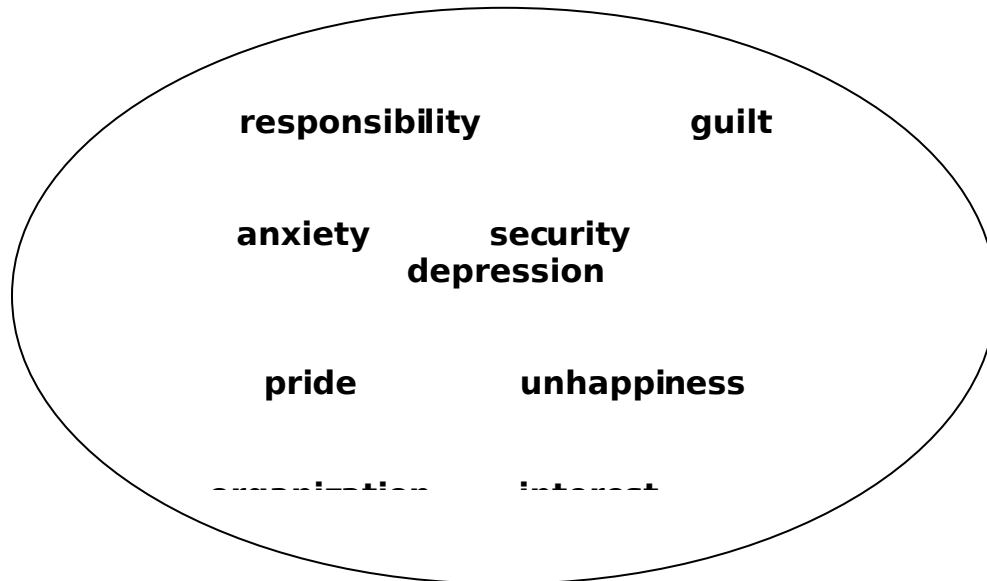
d) Is it easy for you to hold a conversation with your parents? Comment.
